

In 1946, due to the hardships of World War II, John, his sister Mary, brother Peter Jr., parents Peter Sr. and Maria, and his maternal grandparents John and Katharine Weiss were forcefully sent from their Hungarian home to Germany. In 1948, the family travelled to Canada by ship and then by train to Pilger, SK. John worked and lived on his great-uncle's farm west of Pilger until he and his parents bought some land between Pilger and Middle Lake. With help from many good neighbors, they started farming. In the early years of farming, John worked at road construction and carpentry to bring in extra income for his family. In 1959, he married Theresia Knotz. They lived in the village of Middle Lake for a while before moving to the farm site. They had three children: Alphonse, Bonnie, and Betty. John farmed for many years until he physically was not capable at which time he continued giving good advice. He had many interests including curling, bowling, and watching hockey and ball (the Blue Jays being his favourite team). He also enjoyed going to church on Sundays and visiting with people after Mass. His most enjoyable time was watching his grandchildren grow up and teaching them family history, both good and bad. John also liked when other family members brought him fresh fish, "liver", beer and visited with him. John will be lovingly remembered and sadly missed by his wife of 62 years, Theresia (nee Knotz) Reiter; two children and two grandchildren: Alphonse (Marianne) Reiter and children Brendon and Lynnea: and Betty Reiter: and by many nieces and nephews.
